A Note From Our Rector

This week, we are entering our Holy Week where we “contemplate those mighty acts” that God has accomplished through the life, death, and life of Jesus Christ. Today I am

reflecting on what it means to worship a God who died. It was just a few days ago on Palm Sunday (Sunday was so good, by the way!) where we walked with Jesus into Jerusalem, carrying our Palms and shouting "Hossannah!". Jesus brought so much of what he taught and lived into that procession's details, especially with the donkey and Jesus's own determination. Jesus was committed to this way of the cross, this way of suffering and death, as the way he would help bring about God's Kingdom in our lives. And Jesus was committed to this that he was not going to let anything stop him, not even the cross.

It was with this commitment to God's Kingdom that Jesus kept going, and kept going, for our sake; Jesus processed into Jerusalem and carried that cross so we would know, see, and understand what suffering love is all about. So we would know what it really means when we say God Loves us. Jesus showed us just how much and how far that love is willing to go- to the very bitter end. God was willing to suffer and die if it meant that you and I could learn to love God and each the right way. The kingdoms of the world, those propped up by violence and domination, did exactly what they do (and still do) when threatened- they responded with violence and crucified our Lord.

We all know, however, that within God's determination was not only the refusal to stop working for the Kingdom and spreading God's message of love, there was also the determination to turn it all on its head and not let the violence and determination win. The big reversal is that what had always won suddenly did not work- God who loves, suffers, and longs for us also cannot be stopped with human domination and oppression. God's love always wins. Do we believe it? Did the resurrection convince us? Did it call us to a deeper faith and trust in that divine truth?

One of my spiritual exercises this week is to look around and start naming times when groups, news articles, and social media posts use fear and empire tactics to try and get me to act in one way or another. When I see people rage and flail, shout in angry words and tones, and try their best to suppress and dominate, I am trying to notice. Nothing more today, just notice when the values of God's Kingdom are missing and in their place are the tried and true methods of empire. And then, on the other hand, to notice when they are: when fruits of the Spirit are visible: care, concern, slow to anger and of great kindness, strength found in humility, tolerance of difference... suffering love. The Kingdom is all around us and in us- has Jesus's actions this week moved you to see this Kingdom and to be this Kingdom?

From the LIFT Leader's Desk

This past Sunday, I was teaching the LIFT group about the two processions that entered Jerusalem on the Sunday that we now call Palm Sunday. I told them about the contrasts between the two groups on opposite sides of the city.

On one side of the city, there was the parade of war horses, soldiers, weaponry, the power of Rome that made it clear to the extra 200,000+ Jewish people in the city for Passover - *Don't even think about it!* Not only was this representing a king of power, but also a contrasting theology. Caesar's very name meant son of God. No wonder the Jewish people hated this Roman occupation. (Listen to Fr. Jesse's sermon on Sunday for his excellent message on this.)

On the other side of the city, on a lowly donkey, seemingly mocking the Roman parade, the King of Peace rides in. The hordes of peasants who have heard him preach up north in Galilee are waving their simple palm branches and shouting Hosanna. This procession was a different type of majestic, with the crowd joyously welcoming Jesus.

I laid out the week for the LIFTers and how folks often want to jump from Palm Sunday straight to Easter but that it's important to keep walking with Jesus through the three holy days of the Triduum. We need to feel his pain to truly experience the wonderful joy on Easter Sunday. I talked about how Jesus took Peter, James and John (his three best friends) with him to the garden to wait and watch with him. I acted out the falling asleep part as Jesus begs them to stay awake and pray with him, twice. I got out the map to show them where everything was happening. I was teaching my head off (and loving it), trying to give them a drink with a firehose. But they were with me.

At the end of our lessons, I usually ask *What's your takeaway today? What's something new that you learned?* Well, I knew that they had just learned a LOT. So I passed the talking stick around and I made each one tell me what made them say *Whoa!* or *Wow!* or *ooh...* Several tried to pass off easy answers (*You've known that since you were three years old. Tell me something else*). They were squirrely but I threatened that they were going to miss the bagpiper if they didn't hurry up with something new - they had a lot

to choose from.

The talking stick made it to Winston. He was ready with an answer that I was not expecting. *Even Jesus needs friends when he's going through something hard.* Boom! Mike drop! I was totally stunned. I shouted, *Yes! I love that!* We all clapped.

This is why I love teaching. Out of the mouths of babes...I get blessed.

May you get blessed this precious Holy Week. *Even Jesus needs friends when he's going through something hard*, so get in touch and walk with Him this week. That's what friends do.




As Jesus prayed with his disciples immediately before his arrest in the garden of Gethsemane, we too can pray with Jesus at this altar. The disciples of course kept falling asleep, and Jesus admonished them to stay away and pray. If you feel called to come and pray with Jesus as he is present in the Reserve Sacrament of blessed bread and wine, the chapel and the livestream are available to you.

Welcoming Michael Murphy from CUMALI on Sunday, April 16

Michael Murphy, President of CUMALI (Chicago Urban Ministries and Life Intervention) will preach at our 8 and 10 a.m. services on April 16. Michael, a member of Holy Comforter in Kenilworth, will share the story of the crucial ministry of serving homeless residents of Lower Wacker Drive, Chicago.

Michael shared with us: "After retiring in 2009 I found myself with time on my hands and wanting to help others. A new Deacon, Sandy Rex, came to Holy Comforter. During one of his sermons he talked of a ministry called CUMALI he's involved with serving meals to the homeless in Chicago. Soon after I asked if they needed volunteers and I became involved. After a few years Sandy asked if I would lead CUMALI and I accepted. Our mission is simple, be present on Monday evenings, serve a hot meal and listen to our guests.

St. Michael's long-time parish member Jamie Hollensteiner has also been active with the CUMALI mission for over 10 years and can vouch that it is a life changing experience. [Read his December story here.](#)
