Activity: Make a Family Tree, the first step of a Family Diagram

A Family Diagram, also known as a genogram, is a visual representation of the living organism that is our families. It represents more than just genealogy; it also represents the profound emotional connections between generations.

- 1. Begin with your parents (mom and dad) at the top of the page.
- 2. Add all of your siblings, from left to right, with the oldest furthest to the left.
- 3. Make all male members of your family squares and all females circles.
- 4. Use a triangle for someone with an unknown gender.
- 5. Include anyone who has died.
- 6. For each symbol, write the first name, birth date, and death date (if applicable).

In a different color:

- 1. Add your spouse and children and grandchildren (as applicable).
- 2. Make all male members of your family squares and all females circles.
- 3. Use a triangle for someone with an unknown gender.
- 4. Remember to include anyone who has died, too.
- 5. For each symbol, write the first name, birth date, and death date (if applicable).
